



# 2. Pick Up Pet Waste At All Times

Pet waste is a main polluter of the Glenshire Lake, which flows into the Truckee River

Many streams and drainages flow to the Glenshire Lake, so picking up pet waste on and off the trial is important

# 3. Keep Control of Pets

Pets chasing wildlife can be very detrimental, especially during nesting and fawning seasons

Keep dogs from roaming and respect use of leashes for their safety and the safety of others

We requests dogs not go on the Glenshire Lake island

# 4. No RV Living

Pursuant to GDRA rules and regulations

Most exterior improvements require GDRA approval, including but not limited

Defensible space on every property matters toward increasing fire safety for the entire region

# 7. Responsible Use of **Dumpsters, Bins and Carts**

Please contact GDRA staff if you need to use the clubhouse dumpster

Please don't put household trash in the clubhouse bear bins or over the dumpster gate

Please don't overfill seasonal dumpsters: Christmas tree, cardboard, green waste

Please help protect wildlife and store recycle carts in an enclosed area until morning of pick up

# 8. Respect Your Neighborhood

# LIGHT POLLUTION

# Light Pollution Effects On Wildlife And Ecosystems

For billions of years, all life has relied on Earth's predictable rhythm of day and night. It's encoded in the DNA of all plants and animals. Humans have radically disrupted this cycle by lighting up the

Plants and animals depend on Earth's daily cycle of light and dark rhythm to govern life-sustaining behaviors such as reproduction, nourishment, sleep and protection from predators.

Scientific evidence suggests that artificial light at night has negative and deadly effects on many creatures including amphibians, birds, mammals, insects and plants.

### **Artificial Lights Disrupt** The World's Ecosystems

Nocturnal animals sleep during the day and are active at night. Light pollution radically alters their nighttime environment by turning night into day.

According to research scientist Christopher Kyba, for nocturnal animals, "the introduction of artificial light probably represents the most drastic change human beings have made to their environment."

"Predators use light to hunt, and prey species use darkness as cover," Kyba explains "Near cities, cloudy skies are now hundreds, or even thousands of times brighter than they were 200 years ago.

We are only beginning to learn what a drastic effect this has had on nocturnal ecology."

Glare from artificial lights can also impact wetland habitats that are home to amphibians such as frogs and toads, whose nighttime croaking is part of the breeding ritual. Artificial lights disrupt this nocturnal activity, interfering with reproduction and reducing populations.

# Artificial Lights Have Devastating Effects **On Many Bird Species**

Birds that migrate or hunt at night navigate by moonlight and starlight. Artificial light can cause them to wander off course and toward the dangerous nighttime landscapes of cities. Every year millions of birds die colliding with needlessly illuminated buildings and towers. Migratory birds depend on cues from properly timed seasonal schedules. Artificial lights can cause them to migrate too early or too late and miss ideal climate conditions for nesting, foraging and other behaviors.

### **Ecosystems: Everything Is Connected**

Many insects are drawn to light, but artificial lights can create a fatal attraction. Declining insect populations negatively impact all species that rely on insects for food or pollination. Some predators exploit this attraction to their advantage, affecting food webs in unanticipated ways.

# **EXTERIOR LIGHTING**

Common lighting practices can interfere with legitimate public concerns.




- a. The degradation of the nighttime visual environment by production of unsightly and dangerous glare;
- b. Lighting practices that interfere with the health and safety of Truckee's residents and visitors;
- c. Unnecessary waste of energy and resources in the production of too much light or wasted light;
- d. Interference in the use or enjoyment of property which is not intended to be illuminated at night; and
- e. Loss of the scenic view of the night sky due to increased urban sky glow

# **Truckee Municipal Code-Title 18 Development Code**

18.30.060 - Exterior Lighting and Night Sky

1. The use of outdoor lighting is often necessary for adequate nighttime safety and utility, but common lighting practices can also interfere with other legitimate public concerns. Principles among these concerns are:

- Adopt a fire hydrant. Dig out fire hydrants in your neighborhoods
- Check chimneys & vents for debris
- Check furnaces
- Check that smoke alarms are working properly
- Be candle aware



**Energy Savings Program** (Required for all new applicants) Have a certified energy professional evaluate your home for savings opportunities.

Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed.

# IMPORTANT REMINDER

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February.



# Some History of the Birdhouses around Glenshire Lake | Boy Scout Troop 267

In 2009, Sam Arney, a member of Boy Scout Troop 267, wanted to do something for his Eagle Scout project out in Glenshire where he grew up. His troop was contacted by the Glenshire Association to see if they were interested in a project. One project option was "to get more of the local bird life to come out to the pond". Sam wanted to do something that helped the local wildlife, so this project struck a chord with him.

Sam's Dad noticed bird houses out by Prosser, so their team began the research. They noticed some of those houses were made out of raw wood, and stands out of pvc. They learned that using pvc helps keeps predators away because it's hard to climb. They also learned that raw, non-stained wood attracts more birds as they intuitively don't want to breathe in any kind of chemicals. Sam researched the type of birds around Glenshire, leaning toward chickadees and robins, and used a website that provide diameter





of hole needed for each bird. He recalls holes needed to be ¾", not only to keep predators out but to keep larger birds from moving in.

The project received donations from Truckee Tahoe Lumber, Ace Mountain Hardware and Safeway. About 20 Eagle Scouts showed

up to build and install the bird houses. The project was perfectly completed by a great team!

# TRAIL MAGIC

The Truckee Trails Foundation (TTF) knows how much you love to play outside. Whether its hiking, biking, trail running, or horseback riding, seeing your favorite trail receive some muchneeded work can seem like magic. TTF wants to keep providing that magic to our area so you can have safe and enjoyable experiences on our local trails!

Our six-member summer trail crew spends 40 hours a week from May to November, clearing and maintaining Truckee's front country and back country trails. That's almost 1000 hours per month spent transforming our trails for a better future. In the past few years TTF has gotten into the trail building business as well!

In the fall of 2018, TTF's crew completed a fast and rocky feature-filled downhill mountain bike trail called the Big Chief Trail. This 8-mile singletrack adventure was constructed in just under 8 months, has received rave reviews, and will only get better with time. TTF could never have completed this trail without funding from the National Forest Foundation, Vail Resorts Epic Promise, and of course our partners at the United States Forest Service (USFS) and our many volunteers!

TTF was also fortunate to have a second crew (of two) hiking with a chainsaw for the duration of the summer. The crew

cleared nearly 80 fallen trees that blocked trails, built over 100 rock check-steps for water erosion control, cleared hundreds of drains on multiple trails and rock-armor a few muddy sections

on the Donner Lake Rim Trail. In July, the crew spent four days in the Granite Chief Wilderness where the determined team cleared nearly 50 trees from the trails using only axes, crosscut saws and rock bars.

The 2019 season was initially delayed by snow, but the eager crew came in strong and was willing to work in the harsh

conditions. The team kicked off the summer with a new two-mile section that now offers a loop connecting the very popular (and recently USFS adopted) Jackass Trail. This trail will be completed in 2020 and will offer a single-track option all the way to the stoplight on West River Street. OTB, Western States and Hole in the Ground trails were also given much needed face lifts throughout the season, followed by miles of log outs and brushing on some of our most popular trails. The trail crew finished our season by working for the Truckee Donner Land Trust constructing 3 miles of trail that meanders around lower Carpenter Valley. There are stunning views throughout.




