Speak Your Peace—The Civility Project

"Three things in human life are important: The first is to be kind. The second is to be kind. And the third is to be kind." —*Henry James*

The best way to determine what a community wants is to listen to what its people have to say. This is a fundamental principle of democracy. Disagreements can lead to healthy debate, which brings new information and ideas to light.

When a particular issue strikes at the fundamental beliefs of a group or individual, the debate can be especially fierce. In these situations, it becomes more important than ever to practice civility. The purpose of the Speak Your Peace Civility Project is to urge the citizens of the Glenshire/Devonshire area to communicate in a more respectful and effective way. This is not a campaign to end disagreements. It is a campaign to improve public discourse by simply reminding ourselves of the very basic principles of respect.

By elevating our level of communication and avoiding personal attacks and general stubbornness, we can avoid unhealthy debate. This will lead to a more effective democracy, and help maintain our





sense of community by increasing civic participation

We are not just targeting those who are uncivil, but those who allow uncivilized behavior to happen. Our key message is to promote nine simple tools for practicing civility, taken from P. M. Forni's book *Choosing Civility*.

Pay Attention. Be aware and attend to the world and the people around you.

Listen. Focus on others in order to better understand their points of view.

Be Inclusive. Welcome all groups of citizens working for the greater good of the community.

Don't Gossip. And don't accept when others choose to do so.

Show Respect. Honor other people and their opinions, especially in the midst of a disagreement.

Be Agreeable. Look for opportunities to agree; don't contradict just to do so.

Apologize. Be sincere and repair damaged relationships.

Give Constructive Criticism. When disagreeing, stick to the issues and don't make a personal attack.

Take Responsibility. Don't shift responsibility and blame onto others; share disagreements publicly.

River-Friendly Landscaping Rebates Up To \$1,000 Available

The River-Friendly Landscaping program helps Truckee-area homeowners understand how soil erosion from their properties adversely affects the Truckee River watershed.

River-Friendly Landscaping improves water quality by assisting residential property owners in voluntarily reducing or preventing soil erosion. It covers older and established neighborhoods in the Truckee River watershed within the Town of Truckee, Placer County, Nevada County, and within other related counties in California. This program is voluntary. We provide free site evaluations, site plans and assistance for homeowners. To join in the effort, simply call 530.550.8760, ext. 7 and or sign up online at www.truckeeriverwc.org/river-friendly-landscaping/rfl-signup. We will arrange to meet with homeowners and provide a free site evaluation.

As an added incentive, eligible homeowners can receive a rebate intended to reimburse costs for labor and material costs (until all rebate funds are exhausted).



Homeowners are eligible to receive the complimentary full-color guide to landscaping in the Sierra Nevada, the Yard and Garden Guide at www.truckeeriverwc.org/images/documents/SNYG_ Guide.pdf. How are we doing?

River-Friendly Landscaping has been in place since 2009. Here is an update on our work with homeowners to prevent sediment pollution:

- 1000+ participants have requested site evaluations
- 650 site evaluations have been completed
- 400 recommended measures implemented; that's 100 tons of sediment we're preventing from reaching area streams and rivers each year!
- Over \$80,000 in rebates awarded to date
- Our current funding levels will ensure the River-Friendly Landscaping program continues for several more years

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BRIGHTER DOES NOT MEAN SAFER

There is no clear scientific evidence that increased outdoor lighting deters crimes. It may make us feel safer, but has not been shown to make us safer.

A 2015 study published in the Journal of Epidemiology and Community Health found that streetlights don't prevent accidents or crime, but do cost a lot of money. The researchers looked at data on road traffic collisions and crime in 62 local authorities in England and Wales and found that lighting had no effect, whether authorities



had turned them off completely, dimmed them, turned them off at certain hours, or substituted low-power LED lamps.

Outdoor lighting is intended to enhance safety and security at night, but too much lighting can actually have the opposite effect. Visibility should always be the goal. Glare from bright, unshielded lights actually decreases safety because it shines into our eyes and constricts our pupils. This can not only be blinding, it also makes it more difficult for our eyes to adjust to low-light conditions. After all, when you use a flashlight do you point it into your eyes? Think smart lighting, not just lighting.

According to a 2011 study of London street lighting and crime, there is no good evidence that increased lighting reduces total crime." A 1997 National Institute of Justice study concluded, "We can have very little confidence that improved lighting prevents crime."

The truth is bad outdoor lighting can decrease safety by making victims and property easier to see. A Chicago Alley Lighting Project showed a correlation between brightly lit alleyways and increased crime.

Glare from bright, unshielded lights actually decreases safety. Some crimes like vandalism and graffiti actually thrive on bad night lighting.

According to a 2012 report of the American Medical Association, "Glare from nighttime lighting can create hazards ranging from discomfort to frank visual disability."




Don't Embarrass Your Pet

Dealing with pet waste is one of those topics that every pet owner must deal with but no one likes to talk about. The fact is that the majority of community and neighborhood pet problems result from the inappropriate handling of pet waste. In addition, pet waste is the greatest source of potential health risk for your pet and your family. This article will highlight the five most important reasons to properly dispose of pet waste.

1. Disease Control

There are several very common diseases that can be transmitted to dogs, cats and people through feces. These include Giardia, roundworms, hookworms, Salmonella, and E.coli. Did you know



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a heavily infected puppy could pass over a million roundworm eggs everyday? In addition, your dog can spread or contract parvovirus or coronavirus through infected feces. All of these diseases are very serious and common and every effort should be made by pet owners to keep their pets and family away from potentially infected feces.

2. Make the Area more Usable

Nobody likes to walk through an area that is hiding "doggie land mines." It's not right to have people give up a beautiful walk through the Shire because they don't want to step any of those "doggie land mines".

3. Fly Control

Flies will consume and lay eggs in feces. These same flies will then come into your house and then spread disease as they pause on your counter and food. Need we say more about keeping feces cleaned up to prevent this cycle?

Do your doo-ty and dispose of your dog's poop bags properly.

4. Responsible Pet Ownership

Your responsibility to clean up after your pet doesn't end when your dog leaves your yard. There are probably fewer things that aggravate neighbors more than a dog that 'goes' in their yard. Pet owners need to clean up after their pet every time they go to the bathroom. Period. No exceptions. If you are walking in the woods and your dog goes, then bury it. If you are in the neighborhood, pick it up with a plastic bag. Please don't make your responsibility somebody else's problem.

5. Preventing Stool Eating

While most dog owners think this doesn't apply to them or their dog, the shocking truth is that most dogs will engage in this unsavory practice at some point in their life. Dogs evolved as carnivore/ scavengers and feces were considered fair game in lean times. To prevent this occasional indiscretion from becoming a life-long habit, clean up feces as soon as possible.

Pollinators are responsible for 1 out of 3 bites of food we take each day, and yet pollinators are at critical point in their own survival. Many reasons contribute to their recent decline. We know for certain, however, that more nectar and pollen sources provided by more flowering plants and trees will help improve their health and numbers. Increasing the number of pollinator-friendly gardens and landscapes will help revive the health of bees, butterflies, birds, bats and other pollinators across the country.



Our garden has been registered with the National Pollinator Garden Network as part of the Million Pollinator Challenge and is also a certified Monarch Butterfly Waystation.



TWO ZONES MAKE UP THE REQUIRED 100 FEET OF DEFENSIBLE SPACE:

ZONE 1: 30 feet of Lean, Clean & Green

- 1 Remove all dead plants, grass and weeds.
- 2 Remove dead or dry leaves and pine needles from your yard, roof and rain gutters.
- 3 Keep tree branches 10 feet away from your chimney and other trees.

ZONE 2: 30-100 feet of Reduced Fuel

- Cut or mow annual grass down to a maximum height of 4 inches.
- **5** Create horizontal spacing between shrubs and trees.
- 6 Create vertical spacing between grass, shrubs and trees.

Use Equipment Properly to Keep from Sparking a Wildfire

Mow before 10 a.m., and never on a hot or windy day. String trimmers are a safer option (vs. lawnmowers) for clearing vegetation.

VERTICAL SPACING

Large trees do not have to be cut and removed as long as all of the plants beneath them are removed. This eliminates a vertical "fire ladder."



HORIZONTAL SPACING

Create horizontal and vertical spacing between plants, the amount of spacing will depend on how steep the slope is and the size of the plants.

Defensible Space— What Are You Waiting For?

Maintaining defensible space makes your house look better, makes the neighborhood look better increases property values and will save your life. So what are we waiting for?

This last winter was kind enough to give us more precipitation than we have had in the last four years. Along with this come taller weeds and taller fuel ladders. Please cut all the weeds and annual grasses down to 4" or less on all of your property. Leaving that strip along the road because you think you don't have to maintain into the Town's road easement is not only incorrect but could be fatally dangerous. Firefighters in Colorado learned wood fences are akin to a fuse leading to a powder keg. Many houses were lost in some of Colorado's worst wildfires simply because the fences caught fire and lead the fire to the house. Drying in the outdoors for years wood fences catch fire instantly and often lead right to the siding of a house. Keep all flammable materials away from fences and cut down all weeds.

In 2015 wildfires in Clear Lake grew to 8000 acres in 12 hours leaving many residents minutes to evacuate and killing some in the process. Work with your neighbors to help keep your neighborhood safe. Talk to those who have overgrown vegetation and contact Truckee Fire for a defensible space inspection. A better looking and safer neighborhood starts with you.

KEEPING OUR COMMUNITY SAFE

Need another reason? Every year we are contacted by residents who have their home owners insurance canceled. Why? It's because of where we live, and that our community is not a Certified Fire Safe Community. Some insurance companies offer a discount if the community is a Certified First Safe Community.

The people who have read this far about the positives of defensible space are probably the ones who understand the benefits of doing so. We rely on those that do understand to help talk to others who may not understand, and hope you can spread the word that it takes everyone to keep our community safe.




