

We are requesting our Members to provide us with their TFPD inspection to help increase inspection effectiveness.

We are in our 5th year as a designated FireWise Community, which helps provide wildfire safety resources, possible insurance discounts and access to funding. Thank you Members for logging in defensible space hours to help renew our FireWise designation for 2024.

Your Board formed the Governing Documents Committee to assist in the revamping of the CC&Rs and Bylaws that were presented last year, emphasizing clarity, inclusivity, and foresight to the needs of our community as time goes by. Achieving this much needed update hinges on a majority vote from our members.

Even if you have yet to interact with the CC&R's because of not having neighbor complaints or improvement projects, it is ESSENTIAL that you return your ballot by October 14 to ensure ALL of the voices of our community are reflected and heard. **Every vote is critical!**

Here's some of what these newly proposed documents address:

• Uphold Neighborhood Integrity:
By refining wording and reducing constraints, the revamped documents now pave the way for residents to enjoy their properties while preserving the quintessential charm of Glenshire/Devonshire.

- Preservation of Rights: The unique appeal of our neighborhood, currently primarily dictated by the Association Rules, is now embedded within the CC&Rs. This guarantees its preservation against future alterations without the collective agreement of the majority of our community through a vote.
- Wild Fire Safety: A vital inclusion to the proposed CC&Rs are Defensible Space and Fire Safety requirements.
- Clear Parking Guidelines: The revised documents address parking qualms head-on, ensuring members can store and maintain vehicles on their property without ambiguities.
- Support for Compliant Small Businesses: Recognizing the spirit of entrepreneurship in Glenshire, small businesses can now operate peacefully, ensuring they harmonize with the community, cause no disturbance.
- Staying Ahead with Legal
 Compliance: The world is evolving, and so are the town, county, and state regulations. The documents have been updated to stay in compliance with all regulations.

We, the committee, endorse these documents.

First In The Nation Regulations

CAN HELP TRUCKEE/TAHOE RESIDENTS GET INSURANCE DISCOUNTS BY ERIC HORNTVEDT

Last fall, California Insurance
Commissioner Ricardo Lara enacted
the nation's first-ever mandatory
insurance discount program for
homeowners who take steps to
reduce their wildfire risk. The new
"Safer from Wildfires" regulation is
an update to Title 10 regulations –
section 2644.9 – Consideration of
Mitigation Factors which is designed
to reduce insurance costs for
policyholders who take measures
to protect their properties from
wildfire risk.

There are detailed requirements for insurers but the most important for property owners to be aware of include the fact that insurers must offer rate relief to policyholders who take certain mitigation efforts, including the following:

- 1. Clearing debris and vegetation from under decks.
- Clearing debris, vegetation, mulch, stored combustible materials and any movable combustible objects so they are at least five feet from the building.

- Removing any combustible materials - including fences and gates - so they are at least five feet from the building.
- 4. Moving any combustible structures, including sheds and other outbuildings to at least 30 feet from the building.
- The property lot must comply with Public Resources Code S. 4291, which requires a defensible space around the building, removal of trees and trimming of branches near chimneys, and no dead vegetation near roofs.

Further, insurers must offer rate relief to policyholders who take any of the following five mitigation measures.

- Installation of a class-A fire-rated roof, which provides the highest level of fire protection and resistance.
- 2. Design with enclosed eaves, which reduce the risk of embers igniting the roof or entering the attic.

- 3. Use of fire-resistant vents, which resist or prevent the intrusion of flames, embers and radiant heat.
- 4. Installation of multi-pane windows, which help prevent fire from entering the home.
- 5. At least six inches of noncombustible vertical clearance at the bottom of the exterior surface.

Measure T, a wildfire protection tax, passed by voters in 2021, makes available funds for programs designed to reduce the threat and intensity of wildfires in the Truckee and Donner Summit wildlandurban interface area by reducing fuels and better preparing our communities for wildfire. Residents and property owners should know that the Truckee Fire Protection District offers free defensible space inspections as part of Measure T efforts. Any property owner in the district can schedule an inspection, requesting a member of our team to visit homes and make recommendations about improving

defensible space, and structure hardening (Truckee Fire also offers free green waste pick-up and rebates on green waste dumpsters).

Truckee Fire is also working in close coordination with Nevada County on an innovative program called Firewise, a program administered by the National Fire Protection Association. The program provides a collaborative framework to help neighbors in specific geographic areas get organized and take action to reduce wildfire risk and increase the ignition resistance of their homes and communities. Firewise is part of a national effort to ensure communities are prepared against wildfire. As part of the Firewise program, Nevada County created

a searchable map for Firewise communities in this area (including area of Placer County in Truckee).

Everyone who lives in this majestic part of the U.S. knows how lucky we are. Yes, long, wet winters, prolonged drought and wildfires present challenges when it comes to wildfires but it's incumbent on every single one of us to do everything we can to protect our homes, communities and forests.

"Resources like our "Do More Save More, "make it possible for us to partner with California's essential protection agencies," Michael Soller, spokesperson for the Department of Insurance told me recently. "The only way to reduce the risk

of catastrophic wildfire is to work together."

I agree.

In the last few weeks, State Farm and Allstate, two of the largest issuers of homeowners' insurance in California, announced they will no longer sell new coverage in the state. Not just homeowners in fire – or earthquake-prone areas, but everywhere. This makes our mission to help homeowners do as much as they possibly can to protect their property – even more urgent. Please be in touch with us.

Contact GDRA For Exterior Improvement Approvals

Most exterior improvements require GDRA approval, including but not limited to: Painting / Windows / Sheds / Fences / Additions / Parking Areas / Tree Removal.

Use Dark Sky Exterior Lighting

Dark skies are one of the reasons many of us live in the mountains and not a city. Town of Truckee and Glenshire have Dark Sky ordinances. Pick Up Pet Waste At All Times

Pet waste is a polluter of the Glenshire Lake, which flows into the Truckee River. Many streams and drainages flow to the Glenshire Lake, so picking up pet waste on and off trails is important.

Keep Control of Pets


Pets chasing wildlife can be very detrimental, especially during nesting and fawning seasons. Keep dogs from roaming and respect use of leashes for their safety and the safety of others. Please keep dogs off of the Glenshire Lake Island. This is a wildlife and nesting area.

Respect Local Fire Bans

Do not use Fireworks, Bottle Rockets, etc. They are dangerous, not allowed and against the law. Please respect the burn ban season - no burning/campfire/charcoal.

Drive Safely

Please respect the speed limits and bike lanes. Watch out for pedestrians, cyclists, pets and wildlife.

Winter Preparation TIPS FROM LIBERTY UTILITIES

Winter is on the way and with the beauty of new fallen snow comes higher energy usage, the increased potential for power outages, and seasonal safety considerations.

As the days get shorter and the temperatures drop, there is often an increase in energy usage as we spend more time indoors, use more light, spend more time on electronics, and heat our homes. But you can help reduce your winter energy usage by following these tips:

- Heat tape uses a lot of electricity, so unplug it when it isn't needed.
- Set the thermostat to 68° when at

- home and to 55-68° when not at home.
- Open window coverings on the sunny side of your home to take advantage of free heat from the sun. Close the coverings on cloudy days or right after the sun sets.
- Set your water heater to 120°.
- Close foundation vents.
- Replace incandescent bulbs with LED bulbs.
- Caulk windows and weather-strip doors.
- Install a water heater blanket.
- Install hot water pipe insulation.
- Install electrical outlet and switch plate insulation.
- Clean your furnace system and check ducts for leaks.
- · Replace furnace filters monthly.
- Replace normal thermostats with programmable or smart thermostats.





Liberty provides safe, reliable electric service. However, winter weather can lead to unplanned power outages. Liberty crews will work to restore power quickly and safely, but here are some tips to help reduce discomfort in the event of an outage.

- Stay warm Plan to use a safe alternate heating source, such as a fireplace or wood-burning stove during an outage. Remember that fuel- and wood-burning sources of heat should be properly maintained, ventilated, and monitored. Do not leave a flame unattended.
- Stay fed and hydrated Store at least a 48-hour supply of nonperishable food and water.
- Stay prepared Plan for medical needs that may be impacted by a loss of power. Stock your emergency kit with flashlights, batteries, warm clothing, blankets, and sleeping bags.
- Stay informed -Update your contact information online at LibertyUtilities.com or by calling 800.782.2506 to receive outage updates. You can also check the outage map page at LibertyUtilities.com

Holiday Electrical Safety

During the holiday season, there are additional safety considerations, especially if you are decorating your home. Here are some tips to help you stay safe during the holidays:

- Unplug holiday lights before leaving or going to sleep.
- Confirm your electric decorations are free from damage or fraying before using.
- Verify if lights can be used outdoors prior to use by checking the manufacturer's instructions.
- Use a surge protector power strip to help prevent overloading outlets.
- Use LED lights. They produce little to no heat and are therefore safer to use around pets and children.

Electrical Home Safety

With all the appliances, tools, cords, and plugs we use in everyday life, it's important to know how to use them safely.

- If an appliance overheats, unplug it and have it checked.
- Use only electrical equipment that has been approved by a recognized testing laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Keep power cords dry. The

- insulation won't withstand direct heat, repeated yanking, bending, or wetness.
- Don't run a cord under a rug or furniture. It may become damaged or overheat.
- Turn off heating and cooking appliances before leaving home.
- Check all cords for wear. Use double-insulated or properly grounded tools when outdoors or in wet areas.
- Install weatherproof covers on outdoor electrical outlets.
- Use outlets with Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCIs) to help protect against serious shock.

A Friendly Winter Reminder

During the winter, please keep your electric meter clear of snow an ice as well as an accessible path to it. If our meter readers are unable to read your meter, it may result in an estimated bill. Liberty strives to estimate bills as accurately as possible based on historical usage, but an estimated bill may be higher or lower than actual usage. If the bill is underestimated an additional amount due will be required to make up the difference once an actual meter read can be obtained.



Did you know you need GDRA/DRC approval before starting exterior improvement projects?

GDRA Rules require owners to submit a DRC Application for most exterior improvement projects, including but not limited to:

ADUs Painting/Staining Decks Parking Pads

Driveways Roofs Fences Sheds

Garage Doors Tree Removal Landscaping Windows

GDRA staff will normally provide approval status within 7-10 business days. NOTE: Exterior paint colors should be soft (not bright) earth tones, and may not be solid black, white, red, yellow, or blue, except in use of trim (white discouraged). Garage doors must be painted to match or compliment house color.

Design Review Committee (DRC) Approval Process

Details for the DRC process, including fee schedule, can be found on the Resource Center tab at www. glenshiredevonshire.com. The DRC meets 2nd and 4th Tuesdays most months at 7:30am.

Regarding tree removal requests, if your request is for a tree considered hazardous or dying, please email this request to designreview@ glenshiredevonshire.com and we will schedule our forester to inspect at no cost and ask a simple form to be completed. If the inspector deems the tree to be healthy and safe, a DRC application will then be required.

Dog Training Simplified

Human tendencies often lead us to complicate matters unnecessarily, and the realm of dog training is no exception. However, if we distill dog training to its purest essence, regardless of methodologies, age, breed, or gender, two fundamental principles stand out:

What's reinforced grows. This means that the more a dog enjoys doing something, the more likely they are to continue doing it. If a dog is continuing to do something, good or bad, there's reinforcement coming from somewhere. While it's good and necessary to stop undesirable behaviors, that shouldn't be the only focus. The real power of change comes when we work on building the behaviors we want to see and not just on stopping the bad behaviors.

The more a behavior is practiced, the more it becomes a habit. A dog that does something over and over again is not likely to just stop and do something different. While some behaviors may eventually be outgrown as a puppy matures, it's not always guaranteed, and waiting for them to change can be frustrating. Understanding this should then change our approach to how our dogs do things. Managing the environment so that the dog doesn't practice undesirable behaviors helps set them up for success.

Now you'll notice something is painfully absent from those two key points. There's nothing there about how to stop bad behaviors. That's because when we put all the focus on that we end up giving really bad information to our dogs and often end up frustrated ourselves. Unfortunately, this is the main focus for a lot of people, but we can do better for our pups.

So what does this mean for dog guardians?

- Focus on building good behaviors.
 When your dog does something
 you want them to do, be sure to
 reinforce it with something they
 enjoy, such as a treat, praise, or
 play. This will help to increase the
 likelihood that they will repeat the
 behavior in the future.
- Minimize opportunities for bad behaviors. The less a dog practices a bad behavior, the less likely they are to make it a habit. This means setting up your environment so that your dog doesn't have the opportunity to engage in unwanted behaviors. If, for example, your dog jumps up on people, you can teach them a different behavior instead like sit, down, or even a play bow. You can also limit your pup's access to people to jump on while they learn to do something different.

By following these two simple principles, you will start to see real results in your dog's behavior. It takes time and patience, but with consistent effort, you can train your dog to be a well-behaved member of your family.
